  modern rules, celebrating the sport's evolution.
- Provincial Championships: The 2025 Zone & 18+ Provincial Championships were successfully hosted by the Coquitlam Moody Ringette Association, while the U12 Year End Event was held in West Kelowna, and the Club Provincials took place in Richmond. These events showcased the talent and dedication of athletes across the province.
- Western Canadian Ringette Championships: The 2025 Western Canadian Ringette Championships were held from March 26 to 29 in Langley, BC, hosted by the Fraser Valley Ringette Association. Top teams from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba competed in the U14AA, U16A, U19A, and 18+ A divisions. Fraser Valley's 18+ A team earned a silver medal, while Team BC secured bronze in the U19A division.
- Community Engagement: The season saw increased participation and enthusiasm at all levels, reflecting the sport's growing popularity and the effectiveness of development programs.



# NRL BC THUNDER REPORT



Dear Ringette BC Community,

#### BC Thunder: Season Highlights 2024-2025

The BC Thunder had a strong and determined season, finishing third in the Western Division. At the National Championship, the week began with a mini-game against Rive Sud from the Eastern Division. Unfortunately, in the second period, one of our top forwards, Emma Paradis, suffered a serious shoulder injury, forcing her to leave the game and ultimately ending her Nationals journey.



Despite this early setback, the team showed incredible resilience, generating multiple offensive rushes and quality scoring chances. The tightly contested game ended in an overtime loss. Injuries continued to impact the roster, with two additional athletes sidelined. This led to the recall of a player from our affiliate team. Even with these challenges, the Thunder remained highly competitive, giving their all in every game. However, the results didn't fall our way, and the injury toll peaked with the loss of our starting goalie during a must-win matchup.

While the final outcome wasn't what we had hoped—especially given our position as one of the favorites to medal—the program proved its strength, demonstrating an impressive balance between veteran leadership and a promising younger core.

Our Junior Program continues to play a crucial role in supporting U19 BC athletes and in developing talent for future advancement into the NRL program.

Financially, this was our most successful season to date. We remain well on track to meet our objective of running an affordable and sustainable program.

#### **AWARDS & ACHIEVEMENTS**

The BC Thunder also celebrated major accomplishments this season, both on and off the ice.

A special congratulations goes to Sarah MacDonald, who earned the title of Best Goalie of the Year—a well-deserved recognition for her outstanding performance.

Our coaching team, led by Troy Takasaki, Rod Needham, Sasha Campbell-Mongeon, and Petra Ojarabta, was nominated for Coaching Team of the Year, highlighting their excellence in leadership, strategy, and mentorship.

We are incredibly proud of Isabelle Beech, a BC-born player, for being named to the Junior National Team Canada roster, alongside her teammate Marissa Dyck. These selections are a testament to the elite caliber of players developed through the BC Thunder Program.

## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Participation in Children's Ringette increased by 5.41% this season.

#### **CHILDREN'S RINGETTE**

Children's Ringette includes children between the ages of 4 to 9 years of age (U10 and below) and includes FUNdamentals 1, 2, and 3 (U10). It is the critical foundational base for youth ringette and determines, to a large extent, participation trends for future years. FUNdamentals is a critical opportunity to teach athletes not only the basic ringette skills, but basic physical literacy and Fundamental Movement Skills. Creating enjoyable experiences in FUNdamentals supports retention through to older age divisions, as well as recruitment and growth during the key years where families are seeking out positive physical activity experiences for their children.

Ringette Associations worked hard to retain and recruit players to participate in ringette within the Children's Ringette program through four key initiatives:

- 1. Gym ringette sessions at schools and community centers
- 2. Hosting Come Try Ringette events
- 3. Bring a Friend Events
- 4. Encouraging on-going registrations

The Children's Ringette program structure allows for new participants to join throughout the program. Bring a Friend sessions or combining a Come Try Ringette with a FUN 1 and 2 practice can help boost recruitment for Associations well into the fall and even early spring.









#### **COME TRY RINGETTE**



This season, Ringette BC's Come Try Ringette (CTR) program engaged over **466** participants across **49** sessions throughout British Columbia. A significant portion of these participants went on to register for the upcoming season, demonstrating CTR's effectiveness as a recruitment tool for the crucial 12-and-under age category. By continuing to deliver high-quality, safe, and inclusive CTR events, we aim to further increase recruitment and bolster retention rates.

#### **GYM RINGETTE**




Gym Ringette brings the excitement of ringette directly to students across BC, fostering a positive sporting experience and maximizing the benefits of physical activity.

**72** athletes participated in the athlete assessments that were hosted in the Lower Mainland, Kelowna, and Prince George and in 2024. From there **60** athletes screened into the program to participate in the Excellence Ringette Program with Ringette BC.

The program was led by Acting Provincial Programs Manager Megan Howes. In addition to Ringette BC staff, the program was led on the ground by Head Coaches Connie Chapman, David Penner, and Nicole Tjepkema, who were supported by an additional six coaches and the Integrated Support Team.

Together the coaches and the Integrated Support Team led athletes through three (3) in-person training camps that introduced athletes to the daily training environment of a high-performance team and provided them with tools, resources, training, and development to reach their individual athlete goals.

#### **U14 TRAIN TO EXCEL PROGRAM**

The U14 Train to Excel (T2E) program plays a crucial role in introducing young athletes to high-performance ringette, serving as a bridge between local play, U14 Zone and future participation in Excellence Ringette and Team BC at U16.

The U14 Train to Excel Program ran virtually this year with 27 athletes from across BC. The athletes took part in a comprehensive curriculum highlighting holistic athlete development, which covered critical areas for success both on and off the ice. Virtual learning sessions focused on foundational skills, including:

- High Performance athlete Q&A
- Mental performance
- Game Preparation
- Athlete nutrition and recovery
- Game intelligence
- Teamwork and situational awareness
- Ringette rules 101
- Off-season preparation
- Ringette pathway and goal setting

Following regional and game evaluations, virtual U14 Train to Excel program participants had the opportunity to try out for U14 Team BC at a selection camp held in Port Coquitlam in November.

A U14 Team BC roster was selected for the subsequent training camp with Team BC U16 and U19, (January 3-5) before competing at multiple elite tournaments. These competitions were comprised of: Calgary Golden Ring (January 17-19) and Spruce Grove Sweetheart (February 14 to 17) culminating at Western Canadian Ringette Championships (March 26-29).

# U12 COMPETITION INTRODUCTION PROGRAM

Operating within the Lower Mainland Ringette League (LMRL) and Thompson Okanagan Ringette League (TORL), the U12 Competition Introduction (CI) Program provided a vital first step for young athletes exploring competitive ringette. Designed to ease the transition from foundational club play to future U14 Zone participation, the U12 CI Program aims to ignite a passion for the competitive side of ringette while developing key fundamental skills.

In support of this goal, the U12 CI program looked to empower athletes to master essential technical skills, following the U12 Skills Matrix: Learning to Train – Late Stage.



#### The program emphasized skill development and progression toward:

- Cushioning the ring
- Keeping the ring on the ice
- Basic individual skill-based offensive and defensive tactics
- Honing individual mental techniques to be a more effective teammate

This program strived to give athletes their first glance into the competitive world of ringette, providing athletes with a structured platform to explore, develop, and foster a lifelong love for the sport.

The U12 CI season concluded in a fantastic weekend of ringette at the Pacific Challenge Cup (February 7-9), where six (6) teams (3 TORL, 3 LMRL) came together for a fun and competitive event hosted by Ringette BC.

## ICEHAWKS RINGETTE REPORT







Dear Ringette BC Community,

#### Ice Hawks Youth Honoured by Drumming and Singing

In March 2025, participants from the Skwá and Cheam First Nations were honoured by their families, Elders, and ringette coaches with drumming and singing to mark their achievement of completing their ringette season.

26 youth and their families had been participating in the first ever Indigenous Ringette Pilot Project, an 16-week ringette program in Chilliwack that introduces Indigenous youth to ringette in a low-barrier, inclusive, mixed ability and culturally safe environment. As part of the program, each participant was assigned a full set of ringette gear, and received skate rentals, a weekly ice time, snacks, and ringette instruction at no cost to them or their family.

This season marked the first time the youth were able to play with a set of protective ringette equipment as a result of a grant from Ringette Canada. Funding support for the program also came from Skwá First Nation's youth program, the BC Community Gaming Fund, and the Indigenous Sport and Recreation Council (iSPARC).

The program grew out of a collaborative relationship between ringette volunteers and Skwà First Nation over several years. The 2024-25 season was made possible due to a dedicated team of coordinators and instructors including Shannon Bettles, Elia Lockhart, Stella James, Dyan and Mike Kinar, Sidney Crowe, Tracy Townsend, Lily Townsend, Emma Kinar, Phil Chris, Aveline Chris, and Breanna Josephine.

Looking ahead, the program is excited to share the news that it has become a registered non-profit ringette association with a mandate to provide accessible ringette opportunities for Indigenous and equity-deserving participants. It will be developing its program further, training Indigenous coaches, and sharing learnings with other mixed-ability and Indigenous ringette programs.

In the next few months, a case study of the program being compiled by the Sport Information Research Council (SIRC) will be published and a t-shirt fundraising campaign will be launched by Ringette Canada with proceeds going towards supporting the new Ice Hawks Ringette Association.



# COACH DEVELOPMENT



For the 2024-2025 season we had **614** coaches, trainers, and on-ice helpers participate across all divisions. Of this total, **379** were individuals in coaching roles.

Over the course of the 2024-2025 season, BC held **10** Community Sport Initiation (CSI) clinics and **3** Competition-Introduction (CI) clinics across the province, training a total of **106** new CSI coaches and **17** new CI coaches, contributing to the ongoing growth and development of ringette in the province.


## REGISTRATION HIGHLIGHTS

#### 2024 - 2025 SEASON REGISTRATION

Ringette BC is currently holding a total membership of **2765** athletes which is a **13.42%** increase from last season.

The most notable increases were observed in the **Adult Flex** division, which experienced a remarkable **75.68%** growth over the previous season. The **18+** division also saw a significant rise of **31.34%**, while the **U12** division experienced a **19.08%** increase in registrations. These trends reflect strong engagement and expanding participation across key age groups.

Notable declines were observed across several divisions, with the **Masters (30+)** level experiencing the most significant decrease of **8.27%**. The **U16** division saw a **6.97%** decline, followed by **FUN 1** with a **3.08%** decrease, and **U14** with a **2.51%** reduction. These trends highlight areas for potential focus and growth moving forward.



This year, Ice Hawks Ringette and Nanaimo Ringette will look to join our growing family. Ice Hawks Ringette, part of our Indigenous Pilot Project, celebrated a milestone season, highlighting their commitment to providing accessible, inclusive and community-based sport opportunities for Indigenous and equity-deserving participants. Additionally, Nanaimo is rebuilding its ringette community, with the aim to grow their athletic community and strengthen Vancouver Island Ringette. We're excited to support their continued growth!




#### **NORTHERN RINGETTE LEAGUE (NRL)**





# FINANCIAL REPORT

In 2024-2025, Ringette BC's revenue stream was diversified across various sources. Sport and athlete development, along with general membership registration fees, comprised the majority of revenue. Provincial funding through ViaSport and community gaming grants also contributed substantially, enabling the organization to support athlete and coach development, competition programming, and administrative operations. Annual revenue is crucial for sustaining the entire Ringette BC ecosystem, from insurance and Ringette Canada fees to supporting athletes, coaches, officials, quality programs, and essential operational needs.
